#### Sermon

#### **Introduction**

Our Lenten reading was about Jesus and temptation. I am reminded of the story of the man who died and was waiting at the Pearly Gate. St Peter comes out to greet him but looks a bit puzzled "We weren't expecting anyone just now. Wait here whilst I check your records. The man stands and waits and he notices a party going on down beneath the clouds. There is music, food, wine and laughter. I wonder where that is he thinks to himself. At that moment St Peter comes out looking puzzled. "We can't find your records at all. Sorry to keep you but I will have another look." The man gets tired of waiting and looks with envy at the fun being had below. So he eventually decides to jump down and join the party. However, he falls through the cloud and lands in front of the devil. Boiling hot, flames shooting around. The devil grins and says "Welcome to hell" "But I did not want to come here – I just wanted to join the party" "Ah "the devil replies. "I see you have come across our marketing department"

A definition of temptation is the tempter looking through the keyhole into the room where you are living. Sin is your drawing back the bolt and making it possible for him to enter. The reading is set in the context of Jesus experiencing his baptism and then going off alone into the desert - a time for him to choose his methods.

If we have a vision- how do we turn it into reality If we have a dream – how do we make it come true.

For Jesus the choice was between mighty conqueror or patient sacrificial love. This may have been a single period in Jesus' life or a summary of a longer process of Jesus discovering his role and ministry. Temptations recurred throughout his life. At Easter we will remember Gethsemane and the temptation to give in, and then the final tempting taunt of the crowd "If you are the king of the Jews save yourself" The 'lows 'in the desert followed the 'high' for Jesus at his baptism.

That is often our experience at a time when we are most vulnerable. It is often the case that soon after scoring a goal a soccer team relaxes and concedes one. Complacency, self importance and pride are the devils tools!

#### The 3 Temptations

1. Turning stones into bread.
Jesu s would have been desperately hungry. He was experiencing what the poor knew. God provides for his people but he rejected this path.

To use his power for his own interest would destroy his divinity

It would be bribery – people would follow for what they could get. Free gimmicks were banned. Although he fed the 5000 out of love and concern there was no attempt ' to sign people up'

#### Jesus rejected a 'magic'faith

2. Jump from the pinnacle of the Temple This was at a corner – Soloman's Porch. A sheer drop of 450 ft to the Valley of Kedron. What a sensation!

There was no future in it – a 9 day wonder. They would want more and more sensations

It was not the way to use God's power "Do not put the Lord your God to the test" (Deut) If faith can't believe without sensations it is not a real faith

Jesus rejected a sensational faith

#### 3. The mountain top view

Caesar reigned over all the territory and had power over the people. If Jesus had compromised and worshipped the devil he could have power over all the peoples. But kneeling to worship the Devil meant turning to coercion to gain the world. God in Jesus loved mankind. How was he to express that and achieve a response. Not by coercion. Jesus understood that faith grows in a person. He embraced the children, but he did not see them as 'pew fodder'. His heart went out to the rich young ruler who wanted to live a godly life, but he did not force his wealth from him. In the same way the authoritarianism of communism and the unbridled coercive freedom of capitalism have failed to bring about God's kingdom of love, justice and freedom

#### Conclusion

The gospel writers describe Jesus going through the process of prayer, thoughtful reflection, exploring the scriptures, exploring his understanding of people and of his father God, and they put it into the shorthand of the temptations. They are the temptations we face in a modern context, but we face them knowing that with Christ we can triumph. The writer of the Hebrews said

"For we do not have a high priest who sits unable to sympathise with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin" Hebrews 4:15
