Isaiah 43 v 1-7, 'Israel's only Saviour'

But now, this is what the Lord says – he who created you, Jacob, he who formed you, Israel: 'Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine.

When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and when you pass through the rivers, they will not sweep over you.

When you walk through the fire, you will not be burned; the flames will not set you ablaze.

For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Saviour;

I give Egypt for your ransom, Cush and Seba in your stead.

Since you are precious and honoured in my sight, and because I love you, I will give people in exchange for you, nations in exchange for your life.

Do not be afraid, for I am with you; I will bring your children from the east and gather you from the west.

I will say to the north, "Give them up!" and to the south, "Do not hold them back."

Bring my sons from afar and my daughters from the ends of the earth – everyone who is called by my name, whom I created for my glory, whom I formed and made.'

Reflection

It's a when, not an if.

Isaiah doesn't pretend things are all going to be fine. He doesn't gloss over the reality of suffering or couch it in the language of 'maybe', but instead he calls it as it is. When you pass through the waters, and when you walk through the fire.

Sometimes as Christians we have been made to feel as though if we believe, everything will be good. We will be healed, we will have enough money, we will be free of all the things that bind us. And then, if these things don't happen, we feel that we are somehow failing God.

*Liz Carter is an author, poet, and editor living with long terms disabling illness. As a disabled person, she has sometimes been told that she doesn't have enough faith. So, it is a relief for her to read words such as these, words that admit to the struggles we will all go through. It's a relief to see the stark honesty written across them: sometimes things are going to be overwhelming. But....

But. The 'but' is even more important than the 'when' because it is where we find comfort. The waters may almost swallow us up, the fire may almost consume us, but God is there in the waves and there in the flames, walking with us and keeping us from being overcome.

We are called by name, and we belong to God. We are precious and honoured in his sight. God's heart has always been for restoration, and we can take hold of that here and now, even if it feels as though we are on the edge of drowning or being burned by the fire. So today, take hold of one truth: God walks with you.

Fire and Water. Isaiah uses these two elements to illustrate our times of deepest struggle. But as Christians, we can think forward to what these two elements symbolise to us in the New Testament. The waters of baptism, that we do not just rise up from the waters, but we are born again as new people.

The fire of the Holy Spirit, the power and presence of our Lord Jesus Christ, in our hearts, souls and lives today.

Picture Jesus standing in front of you and calling you by name. His voice is under and bursting with love. How do you respond?

Let us pray

Lord, thank you for calling me by name, that you are with me in the fire, and I am not overcome. Help me to hold on to you and to praise you through my storms. **Amen**
