Sermon

The story is told about a weary traveller asking a railway porter, why on earth did they build the railway station 3 miles from the village? I suppose, came the reply, they must have thought it a good idea to have it next to the railway lines!

Even the most modern railway station built 3 miles from the track, is as much an absurdity as a religion out of touch with God. Maybe this was in Jesus' mind when he told the parable about the Pharisee and the tax collector. A gentle dig at those whose religion had become an end in itself rather than a way to God. This theme is found elsewhere in Luke's Jesus story. His concern was directed at the Pharisees (not all of them). There were those who had become so wrapped up in the minutia of the law that it drained all the joy out of their religion About as useful as a railway station 3 miles from the track!

Two men went to the temple to pray – afternoon prayer time. They stood apart from the assembly. One took a prominent position for everyone to see, the other on the edge hardly daring to come in. The Pharisee was "not like other people", fasting on additional days, tithing all that he had and it could be seen. Good for his holier than thou reputation but not for the good of his soul!

By way of contrast Jesus introduces the tax collector. The Romans outsourced this to local people who also "took their cut" - not the most popular people in the community. On this occasion he was standing on the fringes – perhaps feeling unworthy. There was no greater contrast – the one puffed up with self-importance, the other overwhelmed by self-knowledge.

The pharisee reminds me of Tony Hancock in "The Blood Donor". In the waiting room he was boasting of his good works

It's all here in my diary
Congo relief 2 shillings and 6 pence
Self-denial 1 shilling and 8 pence
Lifeboat Day 6 pence
Arab refugees 1 shilling and 2 pence
(All old money!)

And when I'm finally called by the great architect and he says, "What did you do?" I shall just bring out my book and say "Here you are mate – add that lot up!

The prayer of the tax collector however had echoes of the Psalmist. Then Jesus delivered the punch line "I tell you this man went down to his house justified rather than the other" He added "for all who exalt themselves will be humbled and those who humble themselves will be exalted" Jesus turned conventional wisdom upside down. To be justified, be in a right relationship with God, is not achieved by clocking up holiness hours or sticking to religious traditions. God comes to us compelled by love and the only response is to confess our unworthiness. In old fashioned terms we have to recognise that we are sinners and have faith in God's power to forgive and heal. However, educated we are; however sophisticated theologically; however much we can heal. Actualise our faith, we are still brought back to faith and trust. The deep mysteries of life may still remain mysteries. Christianity isn't a series of pat answers to ultimate questions. It is a questing and seeking pilgrimage and it is based on trusting faith in the sacrifice of Christ on our behalf and on his ability to take the weakest life and enable it to reach its fullest potential.

Paul wrote to the Ephesians

"For by grace are you saved and that not of yourselves – it is the gift of God, not of works lest any man should boast"

We seek to reward high achievers and admire go getters. They are lauded by society. Upward mobility is a sign of success and the size of our house or bank balance indicators of our worth. Jesus took an entirely different view, and he took it all the way to the cross. In his upsidedown value system Jesus, through word and deed, sought to show that vulnerability and humility, love and compassion, service and sacrifice are the strengths upon which God's kingdom is built. Any other foundation is as much use to seekers after the kingdom as is a railway station built 3 miles from the track!
